Namat Schools Final

We were delighted to announce our winners for the 2022 Namat Schools Competition during an award ceremony held in October. 81 schools from across Oman participated in this year's competition, entering projects related to the themes of managing waste, water and energy. In May, a panel of judges selected 11 schools to move forward to the last round, with final assessments held during school visits undertaken throughout September. We have been so impressed by the scope and achievements of our finalists this year and were thrilled to award the winning schools their prizes. We would like to thank **Veolia Oman** and **Emily's** Garden for their continued sponsorship of this important education initiative.



Oman Tree Day

On the occasion of Oman Tree Day, we were pleased to launch an infographic celebrating the native species of frankincense found in Oman, Boswellia sacra. Produced in collaboration with the **Environment Authority** and with funding from the **British Embassy Muscat**, the infographic highlights important ecologically information about Boswellia sacra, as well as the key threats and necessary conservations actions needed for its protection. Marine Mammal Survey

For more than 20 years, we have been collaborating on the completion of marine mammal surveys to assess the movement, health and behaviour of different species of whales and dolphins found in Oman's waters, with efforts focused most closely on the endangered Arabian Sea humpback whale (ASHW). During November, the team covered a distance of 1650km, with a total of 25 sightings, accounting for



ASHW Conservation Management Plan Workshop

In November, ESO, in collaboration with the Environment Authority hosted international experts together with local stakeholders to discuss management planning of Arabian Sea humpback whales (ASHW) in Oman and the wider region in a workshop titled "Complementing Development with Conservation". 62 participants, representing 30 organisations came together to learn about the important ASHW research ESO and other stakeholders have been undertaking and to explore the role that Oman can play in the conservation of this endangered species. This workshop is a building block towards a wider regional workshop involving as many ASHW range states as possible. Vulture Conservation Field Updates

Our conservation efforts to support Lappetfaced vultures in Oman are ongoing. Our team are back in the field conducting breeding surveys, expanding our efforts to monitor the occurrence, breeding and potential threats faced by this endangered species. The winter survey will take place for 3 weeks in December 2022 and January 2023 and aims to find new active nests in the governorates of Al Batinah, Al Dhahirah, Al Buraimi and Al Sharqiyah (North and South). A breeding survey of Egyptian vultures will take place on Masirah in February and April 2023. We would like to thank the **Environment Authority** for their ongoing support for this important work.



Oman Desert Marathon Charity Race

The **Oman Desert Marathon** team, together with over 30 ESO volunteers came together to organize a 5km desert night race to raise funds to support ESO. Generous donations from Assaffa Chicken, Desert Diamond Rose Coffee Solutions, AI Forn Café, Oasis Water, Muscat Pharmacy and Tunes allowed 100% of the proceeds from the event to be donated to support the work of ESO. A special thank you to the 82 participants who braved the dunes with just their headtorches for light, all in the spirit of supporting ESO! A special mention to the volunteers who returned early the following morning to ensure we had left no trace of waste along the route.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

Namat Schools Competition

Oman's youth are our most important environmental campaigners for a sustainable future. ESO delivers a range of educational initiatives that target schools, colleges and universities, aiming to raise environmental awareness and promote the adoption of more sustainable behaviors. ESO's education initiatives began with simple school visits and has advanced into the development of more targeted events and campaigns, including our Namat Schools Competition, the focus for this quarter's project spotlight!

ESO's Namat Schools Competition (Namat) is an environmental competition designed to promote the adoption of environmentally sustainable projects in schools. Government schools across the Sultanate are encouraged to form teams consisting of students, staff and a member of the parent's council to implement activities and events to tackle an issue under one of the three themes, (i) waste management, (ii) water management and (iii) energy management. Now in its 3rd year, this project awards cash prizes to the top 3 teams

under each theme to support the sustainability of each project.

With sponsorship from Veolia Oman and Emily's Garden Foundation, the 2021/22 Namat Competition saw 274 schools from 11 governates across Oman engaged. 110 schools submitted proposals, with 81 schools selected to move forward to implement their projects. Final reports were received in May, with a judging panel made up of representatives from ESO, Veolia Oman, and the Oman National Commission for Education, Culture, and Science tasked with evaluating the submissions. 11 schools from 7 governates were selected to move into the final round of the competition.

In September, our judging committee visited each of the 11 schools to undertake the final assessments. Under the patronage of H.E. Dr. Abdullah bin Khamis Ambusaidi, Undersecretary of the Ministry of Education an award ceremony was held on 19th October 2022. 8 winning schools were announced representing 6 different governates in Oman, all of whom received cash prizes; OMR 1000 for first place, OMR 500 for second place and OMR 300 for third place.

The winning teams had successfully implemented projects that ranged from efforts to implement solar energy initiatives in their schools, campaigns to limit food waste combined with initiatives to repurpose unavoidable food waste to produce compost and collecting gray water or AC water to irrigate new plantations at school, with one school successfully producing cucumbers and lettuces for the local community! We have been so impressed by the scope and achievements of our winning teams as well as the support their initiatives have received from their local communities.

ESO aspires to continue to engage and inspire the youth to be representative citizens and activators of change within their communities. With the support of **Veolia Oman**, Namat 2022/23 was launched in November and is already looking to be one of the most popular editions!
